

Use this answer sheet after completing both exercises. The video answers follow the tutorial through 3:20; the second exercise gives both the correct option and the verb form required by the sentence.

Exercise 1 - Video Comprehension

1. C	All three can describe arrival, but context and connotation influence the speaker's choice.
2. B	The choice of expression can communicate the speaker's attitude or interpretation of the arrival.
3. C	Turn up is particularly associated in the video with timekeeping.
4. C	The timekeeping implied by turn up can be positive, negative or neutral depending on context.
5. A	Show up can highlight somebody becoming present, particularly when the appearance is unexpected.
6. B	The video uses the example of a cousin appearing after being away for about ten years.
7. C	Rock up can suggest a casual, opportunistic, arrogant or uninvited arrival.
8. A	The example involves gatecrashers - uninvited people - arriving at a party.
9. C	The basic meanings overlap, but speakers can use the different expressions to communicate additional connotations such as surprise or sarcasm.

Exercise 2 - Verbs with UP: Arrival and Approach

Remember: the most useful clue is often the situation. The verb may show timekeeping, unexpected presence, attitude, speed, manner, transport, or the way someone or something approaches an endpoint.
